

The second section of the Logical Reasoning section contains 25 questions. These questions are designed to test your ability to identify any flaws in an argument.

To answer these questions correctly, you must be able to identify the type of flaw that is present in the argument. There are many different types of flaws, but some of the most common include:


Here are some tips for answering Logical Reasoning questions correctly:




